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Green School Policy

This policy has been formulated by Powerstown ETNS to assist teachers, pupils and parents in making an informed decision in relation to promoting and maintaining a green school.

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Policy Introduction

In Powerstown Educate Together we care greatly about environmental issues and as a result we are part of An Taisce's Green School Programme. This involves setting up a committee of teachers, pupils and parents. The aim is to make environmental awareness and action an intrinsic part of the life and ethos of the school. These efforts are awarded through An Taisce's Green Flags for schools.

<u>Aims</u>

- To understand the impact of the actions of people on the environment
- To explore how we can enhance our environment for future generations through energy conservation, reducing waste, composting, recycling and reuse
- Become aware of the impact of air, water, waste and litter pollution on natural and manmade environments
- Develop an understanding of conservation e.g. Recycling, energy and water
- Develop a responsible ownership of the classroom and school environment
- Promote alternative methods of transport to and from school e.g. cycling, scooting and walking to school.
- To foster a sense of responsibility for the long term care of the environment and a commitment to promote the sustainable use of the Earth's resources through personal life style and participation in collective environmental decision making.
- To enable the child to live as an informed and caring member of Local, National, European and Global Communities.
- To acquire open, critical and responsible attitudes towards the environment.
- Through explanation, investigation and hands on experiences the children will acquire skills to help care for our environment immediately and have a long term impact

Awards/ Competitions

Activities and information campaigns such as the following are currently running within the school:

We give out Green Awards weekly during assemblies. These certificates are awarded to children that take the most effort to be 'green', i.e. recycling paper, using the compost bin correctly, picking up litter outside, looking after our school garden and generally being conscientious. The correct usage of the bins – litter,

recycling and compost is taken into consideration for individual certificates.

As the school grows we aim to have a weekly tidy classrooms competition. Members from the

competitions committee go around to each classroom everyday (after each lunch break) in order to ensure

that the standard stated as part of the tidy classrooms guidelines has been maintained on a daily basis.

We take part in the Fingal County Council Tidy Schools Art Competition which all classes take part in.

Recycling

Paper Recycling Bins: (white)

A recycling bin for paper is placed in the staffroom, office and in each classroom to ensure that any waste

paper not suitable for the scrap paper tray will be recycled.

Litter Bins -General Rubbish: (red)

A general litter bin is also placed in each classroom to cater for the disposal of normal classroom waste i.e.

left over pieces of food, floor dirt, old crayons etc. and this is emptied on a daily basis.

Compost Bins: (brown)

Each classroom also has a compost bin for fruit peelings, cores and other organic waste. The content of this

bin is emptied into the main compost bin twice weekly by members of the Greens School Committee. This

bin is located in the school garden. The teacher's staffroom is also equipped with three bins in order to set

a good example to the younger members of the school and to reinforce the message that everyone is

doing his/her part in caring for the environment.

These bins have been donated by Fingal County Council.

Energy

The Green School Committee act as the classroom energy monitors ensuring that all appliances are

completely switched off when not being used in an effort to conserve energy. Lighting within the school is

generally cost effective and environmentally friendly fluorescent types are used in all classrooms. The

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committee monitor the Energy usage and graph this on a monthly chart which is displayed on our Green School Website. This information is displayed on our Green School notice board. We participate in the Guzzler workshops were energy conservation is celebrated through a poster competition.

Children wrote pledges to save energy such as "Switch off those lights if you don't need them!" and other mottos.

A child in each class is assigned the task of switching off all lights at break-time and before going home in the evening.

Water

A campaign for the benefits of water conservation was introduced by class teachers. Children wrote pledges and created posters on the topic in order to advertise the benefits of saving water for the future. Water conservation measures were installed in the school in 2012 comprising displacement bags in the cisterns, percussion taps in the sinks, including isolation valves and thermostatic mixing valves.

Water usage is being monitored and this is graphed on a monthly chart which is displayed on our Green School notice board.

Other Initiatives:

Lunchbox Policy:

Whatever comes in the child's lunchbox goes home in the lunchbox - i.e. a yoghurt pot, a wrapper, half eaten sandwich. This policy has numerous benefits.

- (1) It dramatically cuts down on the schools waste.
- (2) It encourages the parents to think of more ways to reduce their own waste
- (3) The parents can see how much their child is eating.

Pupils are encouraged to use a reusable drinks container daily. Each child is also encouraged to have a lunchbox and not to use Clingfilm or tinfoil. Cartons, yoghurt tubs (which must be washed out), cereal bar wrappers etc. are put back into the child's lunch box to ensure that the school's overall waste is kept to a minimum.

Paper Tray in Staffroom:

The staffroom has a paper tray and once a week this paper is taken into the classroom where it is used by the children for free colouring activities or art activities. There is also a campaign within the classrooms that use "G.O.O.S." box (Good on one side) which is used as a resource.

Re-Use:

Children are encouraged not to use tinfoil or cling-film in their lunches, to re-use plastic bottles for their drinks, conserve paper by writing on the back of sheets deemed "waste" etc. We also encourage the children to take their waste home with them so as to cut down on the volume that the school actually produces. Targeted Recycling Weeks throughout the year will be introduced where old phones, used batteries, ink cartridges and old clothes will be collected and sent to the relevant agencies or to the proper centre's to be recycled.

Staff will keep recyclable items for art materials i.e. toilet rolls, cardboard, paper, tinfoil, recycled bottle tops. Biscuit tins, plastic baby food containers etc. are used to store maths equipment. Jars are used for art materials .Lunchboxes and re-usable drink containers are reused for lunches.

Text-A-Parent with Aladdin Schools:

Where possible parents will be texted school information instead of sending out individual letters with each child. This will cut down greatly on the amount of paper being used by the school.

Photocopying and Scrap Paper:

It is policy with staff to photocopy on both sides of each page to reduce paper waste. Staff must also photocopy on black and white unless essential.

Each classroom must have a scrap paper tray where used sheets can be put for children to draw on/colour in instead of using new pages.

National Spring Clean:

Once year the whole school will take part in the National Spring Clean initiative. This involves all the children and staff cleaning up their local area. The Junior Classes will focus on their immediate school

environment and the older classes will focus more on the local community e.g. playground, carpark, local green areas.

National Tree Week:

Once a year the whole school will take part in National Tree Week. This involves children learning all about trees, how beneficial they are and what can be done to help the trees/ earth. This is linked into the classes curriculum work with art and poetry projects for different classes.

Recycling Point:

A whole school recycling point has been set up at the back of the school. All children, parents and guardians have been informed of what needs to be collected e.g. mobile phones, batteries, cereal boxes etc. Children can put any items to be recycled into the school Recycling Robot at the front door which is then placed at the rear of the school by the teacher representative for the Green School Committee.

National Walk to School Week:

Once a year the whole school take part in National Walk/Bike/Scoot to school Week. This involves children learning about the benefits of exercise, road safety and use of more environmentally transportation. This is linked into the classes curriculum work with P.E., SPHE, SESE and Learn Together.

School Garden:

A school garden has been set up where children have planted vegetable and flowers throughout the year. Parents have helped with the purchasing of equipment and bulbs and also supervised the classes during planting. There is a number of flower beds which we aim to increase. Due to the building of a new school and site plans have being designed to include a larger space for the cultivation of plants. Collaboration with the neighbouring school has been initiated to increase the green school awareness and sense of community.

Forest School

Forest School is an initiative conducted by the Science Co-ordinator and Green School Co-coordinator to instil in the children a sense of ownership and respect for the local environment. It is an inspirational

process that offers ALL learners regular opportunities to achieve and develop confidence and self-esteem through hands-on learning experiences in a woodland or natural environment with trees.

Forest School is a specialised learning approach that sits within and compliments the wider context of outdoor and woodland education.

Environment

In keeping with our on-going environmental awareness, Powerstown Educate Together's Healthy Eating Policy will also reduce the amount of litter in the school and will give the pupils an understanding of how people affect the world around them and how they can improve it.

In doing this, we will encourage the pupils to cut down on litter produced by packed lunches e.g. using resealable bottles instead of cartons or re-usable airtight containers rather than disposable wrappings.

A large percentage of school waste is composed of organic material (e.g. fruit and vegetable peelings). Pupils will use special compost bins to dispose of organic material. This compost will be used as soil conditioner or surface mulch to help us in maintaining our school gardens.

Any packaging left over from a child's lunch is brought home in the lunch box for disposal. Any fully uneaten lunch will be sent home so that parents can monitor how much their child is eating.

Green Council

The school has set up its first Green School Committee, which is made up of one teacher, the principal and two representatives from each class from Junior Infants up to the mixed Senior class. This will be twenty children in total.

- Their peers vote the students onto the council.
- The student members remain the same for the year to ensure continuity.
- The Green Council members liaise regularly with the school principal.

Green Flag

The school has been awarded its first Green Flag for the themes of Litter and Waste in September 2013.

The school has been awarded its second Green Flag for the themes of Energy in September 2015.

The school will now begin to focus on its third Green Flag with the theme of Water. It is the aim of the school to continue working on renewing the previous themes while simultaneously working on efforts for the new flag.

Acknowledgement of Effort

The council meets regularly and involves itself in initiatives to improve the school environment through e.g. the Green Awards for the most conscientious student throughout the week. As the school grows we will also include Green Classroom Awards for the tidiest / most energy saving (all appliances turned off) classroom as well as foster an awareness throughout the school of the importance of environmental issues.

Curriculum

The school views environmental issues as being fundamental to the curriculum

Teachers are encouraged to nurture a respect for the environment in their students

Environmental / Green issues are key elements of both S.E.S.E., S.P.H.E. and the 'Ethics and the Environment' strand of the Learn Together Ethics Curriculum.

Practical issues that we aspire to:

Turn it off campaign - e.g. water, electricity (lights, computers, CD players etc.).

Composting our fruit remains from lunch.

Composting pencil sharpening, newspaper and anything else suitable home our litter from our lunch.

Monitor the heating.

Don't leave windows open if the heat is on.

Turn off hot water in main building.

Monitoring who walks, cycles, and scoots to school.

Mission Statement
